




News from the President

10th IAAS International Congress, Budapest, Hungary



The Hungarian Association For Ambulatory surgery hosted the 10th IAAS Congress on ambulatory surgery on 4 – 8 May 2013 in the beautiful capital Budapest. The President of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences, the Patron of the Congress, gave the opening speech and on the second day, the Hungarian Minister of Healthcare visited the Congress and gave some positive words about the importance of day surgery as a catalyzer of healthcare reform process in Hungary. A total number of 710

participants from 27 countries attended this important event, where an array of more than 100 invited speakers gave lectures and actively participated in round tables. More than 200 excellent papers (free papers and posters) were presented. In spite of the severe world economic crisis, 14 national and international companies sponsored or took part in the exhibition area, among them was Vanguard, the famous distributor of the Mobile Day Surgery Units. The social programme was very rich, including all the features of Hungarian folklore, such as dancing, horse show and the famous Hungarian gastronomy. Health System Reform and the Progress of Ambulatory Surgery in China.

On April 6th 2009, the Chinese central government launched a new health reform plan aimed at rebuilding China's existing healthcare system. This reform has significantly increased Chinese citizens' outpatient visits and inpatient admission rates, as well as the need for ambulatory surgery. China is now ushering in an era of rapid development of ambulatory surgery following the trend of expanding from big city hospitals to local grass-root hospitals. Accompanied by the establishment of medical security system, the provider payment system reform of public hospitals has further accelerated the progress of ambulatory surgery in China.

The earliest ambulatory surgery in China took place in Wuhan Children's Hospital in 2001, with the setup of sickrooms especially for ambulatory surgery. The hospital currently covers four diseases including hernia, hydrocele, phimosis and cyst of urethral orifice. From 2009 to 2011, the hospital completed 18,495 cases in total, achieving good social and economic benefits.

At present a great number of A-level tertiary hospitals in Beijing, Shanghai, Hubei, Sichuan and Guangdong have been broadly performing ambulatory surgery since 2006, which accounts for 20.6% of the total elective surgeries. The results achieved are quite good: the average length of stay (ALOS) declined, while efficiency apparently improved.

In March 2012 CNHDRC founded the "China Ambulatory Surgery Alliance" which is devoted to encouraging technology innovation and research, and advancing the technical capability of ambulatory surgery. It also explores and establishes national technical and managerial regulations on ambulatory surgery (including scope, quality assurance standards, clinical pathways, and management principles for ambulatory surgery). Furthermore, it is dedicated to take part in the study on ambulatory surgery's provider payment system, establishing the platform for international collaborations, broadly developing international academic exchanges and collaborations, making China promptly absorb international state-of-the-art experiences and assisting more international organizations and hospitals to build long-running partnerships with China's health system. The good news is on May 13th 2013 China became a member of the International Association for Ambulatory Surgery. China will accelerate the pace of the development of ambulatory surgery through extensive international talks and international friends' powerful assistance.
